Title of Presentation: Point Shooting with the Handgun

Presenters: Sgt Ulf Petersson & Sgt Peter Fredriksson **Agency:** National Police (Sweden)

Brief overview of Presentation: Point Shooting with handgun based on techniques pioneered by Fairbairn, Sykes and Applegate. The course will begin with a 10 min presentation of the use of firearms statistics in Skane PD, Sweden. The course will be following the Skane PD syllabus. In the end of the course there will be some drills, with blue guns that will put the system into realistic situations.

Title of Presentation: Offensive Shooting

Brief Overview of Presentation: This class will teach the shooting methods of the WW2 British Commandos/Rangers, as well as those of the early 1970's S.A.S./Delta Force Hostage rescue shooting methods. Also included will be the Army's Reflexive Shooting program and the newer Close Range shooting skill sets. Topics will include point/rapid aimed/reflexive shooting with carbine and pistol, shooting while rapidly closing with the bad guys and basic methods of room combat.

Title of Presentation: Select Fire Operator (8 hour class)

Presenter: Frank Korn

Agency: Methuen PD

Brief Overview of Presentation:

Teach students how to operate a select fire weapon.

Teach the select fire doctrine as it applies to Law Enforcement applications.

Discuss weapon sight and weapon light use and options.

Discuss suppressed weapon options. Advantages/disadvantages.

Perform full auto burst drills. Strong and support side.

Consistent 2-3 round full auto bursts are mandatory for successful completion of the course.

Strong and support side select fire shooting.

Shooting on the move, forward and backward.

Box drill shooting.

Transition from semi auto to full auto.

Transition from select fire weapon to pistol.

Fire at least two select fire qualification courses of fire for score. Minimum passing score is 94% with 100% round accountability. Your score includes any transitional pistol rounds fired.

Complete the written test with a minimum passing score of 80%.

Select fire weapon* w/ambidextrous sling (submachine gun or full auto rifle/carbine firing from a closed bolt)

Please zero your weapon prior to class. If you can shoot a 4-inch, 3 shot group on Semi at 25 yards, you will be fine.

At least 3 magazines for your select fire weapon and some method of accessing them.

**An M-16/AC 556 type weapon with the 3 shot burst option does not work well for select fire training. A weapon with 2 shot burst or full auto fire is fine. Please zero your weapon prior to class. If you can shoot a 4-inch, 3 shot group on Semi at 25 yards, you will be fine.*

Brief Overview of Presentation:

A simplistic, but yet effective, defense against a spontaneous edged weapon attack utilizing hand techniques to attack the attacker. *Students who successfully complete this class will be certified as an Edged Weapon Awareness and Spontaneous Defense instructor through S&W Academy.*

Title of Presentation: “Using Pistol Action Shooting Sports Skills in Police Firearms Training”

Presenter: Sergeant John T. Catterall **Agency:** New Bedford PD

Brief overview of Presentation: Introduction to the action shooting sports disciplines of the International Defensive Pistol Association (IDPA) and the United States Practical Shooting Association (USPSA) and an overview of the rules and scoring of the games; have the students shoot various courses of fire that will include several examples of various props used in the sports, i.e. poppers, drop-turners, swingers, moving targets, barricade shooting, etc.; and show them how they can build inexpensive wooden target stands, PVC walls, etc. to use in their police firearms training

Title of Presentation: Patrol Rifle Marksmanship (8 hours)

Brief Overview of Presentation :

Teach students how to properly sight in patrol rifles using iron sights and optical sights (25-yard zero).

Teach the advantages of patrol rifles over pistols in Law Enforcement applications.

Discuss weapon sights and weapon light use and options.

Learn limits of accuracy by firing precision shots after short periods of simulated stress.

Fire CMP style match – Max score 400 – Iron sights & optics if time permits

Required equipment:

- A commonly accepted patrol rifle. The class will be geared toward either an AR-15 or an M16 (converted to semi / or in semi only).
 - 500 rounds of ammunition for your patrol rifle and 100 rounds of pistol ammunition.
 - You will need at least 2 magazines for your patrol rifle and some method of accessing them.
 - Pistol with at least 2 magazines and a secure holster.
 - Eye and ear protection, a bullet resistant vest, sunscreen, insect repellent, a baseball hat and rain gear.

Title of Presentation: MPTC Less Lethal Instructor (8 hours)

Brief Overview of Presentation: This the MPTC standardized program to qualify instructors with the 12 ga. shotgun firing beanbag (drag stabilized) rounds and the 40mm launcher firing direct impact (foam / sponge) munitions. This is a direct fire, high energy munitions, single target less lethal program.

12 Gauge Shotgun* with 10 beanbag (drag stabilized rounds)

40 mm launcher* with 10 foam / sponge rounds

Title of Presentation: Longer Range Patrol Rifle

Brief Overview of Presentation This block of instruction will take the student beyond the 50 yard MPTC qualification course out to 100 yards. Using basic and improvised shooting positions, the student will use an optically equipped patrol rifle to achieve hits on targets at various ranges.

Required Equipment:

Patrol rifle with a low to medium power magnified optic, (minimum 3x preferred) which has been properly mounted, previously tested and zeroed.

Sling on the patrol rifle

Shooting mat or ground cover

Brief Overview of Presentation

Look at the various models - Colt SP1 Rifle/Carbine, M16A1 Rifle, M16A2 Rifle, M4 Carbine and M16A4 Rifle

Title of Presentation: Point and Precision Handgun

Brief Overview of Presentation:

This block of instruction will cover engagement of targets with a handgun, utilizing target focus as well as precision sighted fire. This will be a LIVE FIRE skills course. Students will learn the basics of both target focused fire and precision sighted fire. Students will then learn to which technique is appropriate, based upon their own ability, as well as size of, and distance to, the target. Students will practice transitioning between the two techniques while engaging multiple targets.

Required Equipment:

Semi-Automatic Pistol or Revolver
Strong side belt mounted holster, IWB or OWB.
At least 2 spare magazines or 3 speed loaders/moon clips/speed strips
300 rounds of pistol ammo.

Title of Presentation: Why Patrol Rifles - Creative Ways to Start a Program

Brief Overview of Presentation: Overview on needs of patrol rifles, selection of rifles, ammunition and accessories, creative ways to start a rifle program,

Title of Presentation: LEOSA Retiree Certification Course

Presenter: Ed O'Leary

Agency: MLEFIAA Training Staff

Brief Overview of Presentation: Massachusetts regulation requires retired law enforcement officers who wish to carry a concealed handgun under the provisions of the Law Enforcement Officers Safety Act to qualify annually under a prescribed course of fire. This program meets all the federal and state standards currently in place and will provide the retiree with the certification necessary to comply with 18 USC 926C and 501 CMR 13.02.

Please read over the required equipment list. You MUST have all the necessary documentation in order to take the class. Because the law specifically requires this documentation we are not able to make any exceptions to this rule.

The state requires four hours of instruction including the 50 round qualification course of fire.

Title of Presentation: Firearms Training Under MPTC Guidelines

Presenter: Todd Bailey

Agency: Kingston P.D. / MPTC Training Staff

Brief Overview of Presentation:

In early 2010, the state instituted minimum training standards for municipal police handgun training. Soon, there will be standards for patrol rifle and shotgun as well. The standard of training applies to all sworn municipal police officers, full or part time, who carry a firearm in the course of their duties. The new standards have resulted in a great deal of misunderstanding and rumor concerning them.

This course will give the department firearms instructor a brief background on how the standards were developed and break down the qualification courses into elements which can be used to meet the training requirements of the new mandate. Instructors will be shown how they can implement new training into their agency's program with minimal impact on their budget.

200 rounds of duty pistol ammunition

100 rounds of patrol rifle ammo

50 rounds of shotgun ammo (25 slug, the rest can be bird shot or buck shot)

Title of Presentation: EQQC

Presenter: Bill Leanos **Agency:** Gloucester PD/MPTC

Brief Overview of Presentation: In this class students will shoot at extremely close quarters and move out of the threat zone, shoot from alternative positions and work as pairs communicating to address threats. The student will perform dynamic handgun retention via the use of a cutting instrument they carry with them each day. Students will be exposed to the difficulties they may encounter trying to access their folding knife while trying to retain control of their weapon. Be prepared to roll around on the ground and get dirty.

Required equipment:

250 rounds

6 pistol dummy rounds

Wrap around eye protection, hearing protection, body armor

Folding knife with pocket clip which can be opened with one hand

Title of Presentation: Advanced Firearms Instructor (8 hours)

Presenter: Cliff Alves **Agency:** Gloucester PD/MPTC

Brief Overview of Presentation: Level II firearms instructor (formerly called “advanced firearms instructors) is the basic level required to instruct at the academy level or to teach the new 20 Hour Reserve Intermittent Firearms program. This course is designed to teach current Level I (Basic) firearms instructors how to teach recruits, auxiliary and reserve officers. The course will focus on the core fundamentals, helping and teaching the problem shooter .

Requirements:

The instructor shall –

1. Have a minimum of 4 years of documented experience teaching at their agency;
2. Successfully complete the MPTC Instructor Development Course or equivalent;
3. Must be sponsored by agency head;
4. Must meet program specific requirements

Title of Presentation: Snub Nose Revolvers

Presenter: Bert DuVernay **Agency:** New Braintree P.D.

Brief Overview of Presentation: The short barreled revolver is often overshadowed by the almost bewildering array of semi-automatic pistols available today. Even so, the serious defensive shooter must consider the advantages of the “snubby.” The ratio of power to size, weight and concealability is greater with the snub nose revolver than with any semi-auto pistol. The absence of a reciprocating slide and case ejection can be a great advantage in a close quarter confrontation. This course will teach the defensive shooter how to make the most of this legendary piece of equipment and is an overview of the 2 day course taught by this instructor at Sigarms Academy.

 - Disposable jacket with pockets near waistline (we will shoot through the pockets, destroying the jacket)

Brief Overview of Presentation:

The shotgun is undoubtedly one of the best combative weapons available today, while also being one of the most misunderstood. This fast moving and dynamic course provides an aggressive and practical method for employing the shotgun. Students will be provided with a practical understanding of the combative shotgun, its limitations and methods to maximize its performance. Additionally, heavy emphasis is placed on weapons manipulation skills, tactical movement and unconventional shooting positions. Practical application exercises are combined with stimulus/response conditioning principals and the development of a winning mindset.

The lessons will culminate with a scenario designed to incorporate all drills with a prize for the person with the best score.
